

Stamps That Don't Soak

In 1974, the USPS introduced the first self-adhesive stamp for Christmas. This stamp had the words "Peace on Earth" and the image of a weathervane in the shape of a dove. This stamp had some real problems (beyond the scope of this article), so self-adhesive was not tried again until 1999 and the Sonoran Desert sheetlet with the stamp imbedded into a single image on the pane. Today, all USPS issued stamps are self-adhesive.

To help collectors identify which stamps won't soak off in warm water, the Scott Catalog has started putting a capitol "S" inside a red circle adjacent to the stamp's title for those. See the image, Figure 2, below from the catalog. This can be found in the catalog near US #1552, the self-adhesive Christmas stamp.



For stamps that won't soak off in water, many can be removed using lighter fluid and other chemicals. This author finds this expensive, time-consuming, and potentially damaging to the stamp. It is recommended to simply trim the envelope paper neatly with about a 2mm margin on each side.

In conclusion, when sorting modern US stamps on-paper to soak, one can check the catalog for this symbol to know if won't soak. This is especially valuable for the transmission years when stamps were issued in both formats.


